Curriculum Aims

The purpose of our curriculum is to:

- enable children to become confident, resourceful, enquiring and independent learners;
- foster children's self-esteem and help them build positive relationships with other people;
- develop children's self-respect and encourage children to respect the ideas, attitudes, values and feelings of others;
- show respect for all cultures and, in so doing, to promote positive attitudes towards other people;
- enable children to understand their community and help them feel valued as part of this community;
- help children grow into reliable, independent and positive citizens for the 21st century.

Curriculum Approach

- Learning reviewed daily (retrieval practice);
- New content taught in small chunks;
- Effective teacher questioning;
- Lots of teacher modelling;
- Regular opportunities for children to think, apply and practise key skills and knowledge;
- Support for difficult tasks;
- Develop long term memory, whilst respecting the limitations of the working memory.

Main Learning Focus in Mathematics:

Children will learn to:

- recognise the place value of each digit in a four-digit number (thousands, hundreds, tens, and ones)
- count in multiples of 6, 7, 9, 25 and 1000
- identify, represent and estimate numbers using different representations
- count from 0 in multiples of 4, 8, 50 and 100; find 10 or 100 more or less than a given number
- find 1000 more or less than a given number
- order and compare numbers beyond 1000
- round any number to the nearest 10, 100 or 1000
- solve number and practical problems that involve all of the above and with increasingly large positive numbers
- add and subtract numbers with up to 4 digits using the formal written methods of columnar addition and subtraction where appropriate
- estimate and use inverse operations to check answers to a calculation
- solve addition and subtraction two-step problems in contexts, deciding which operations and methods to use and why



Main Learning Focus in Science:

Phases of Matter

Children will learn the answers to the following questions:

- What are the properties of solids, liquids and gases?
- How do particles behave inside of solids, liquids and gases?
- What happens when you heat or cool each state of matter?
- What are changes of state and why do they take place?
- How can we measure the melting points and boiling points of a substance?
- Which substances do not fit into one state of matter?

Main Learning Focus in History:

Roman Britain

Children will learn the answers to the following questions:

- How did the Roman Empire become so powerful?
- How do the Romans conquer Britain?
- Why did Boudicca lead a revolt against the Romans?
- How did the Romans change Britain?
- What did the Romans believe?
- Why did the Romans leave Britain?

Main Learning Focus in Computing:

During computing lessons, Year 4 will be using 'Purple mash' to complete a unit on coding.

The key objectives are:

- To use selection in coding with the 'if/else' command.
- To understand and use variables in 2Code.
- To use flowcharts for design of algorithms including selection.
- To use the 'repeat until' with variables to determine the repeat.
- To learn about and use computational thinking terms decomposition and abstraction.



Main Learning Focus in Religious Education:

Why are festivals important?

- What is worth celebrating?
- Why is Divali significant to Hindus?
- Why do Muslims celebrate at the end of Ramadan?
- Why do Jewish people celebrate Pesach every year?
- What can we learn from celebrations and festivals?

Main Learning Focus in PSHE:

Me and My Relationships

- Demonstrate strategies for working on a collaborative task;
- Define successful qualities of teamwork and collaboration.
- Explain what we mean by a 'positive, healthy relationship';
- Describe some of the qualities that they admire in others.
- Describe 'good' and 'not so good' feelings and how feelings can affect our physical state;
- Explain how different words can express the intensity of feelings
- Identify a wide range of feelings;
- Recognise that different people can have different feelings in the same situation;
- Explain how feelings can be linked to physical state.

Main Learning Focus in Physical Education:

Main learning Focus in Music:

Children will learn how to play the Violin – taught by Rochdale Music Service

Main learning Focus in French:

To talk simply about your family in French

- Remember the nouns for family members in French from memory.
- Describe our own or a fictitious family in French by name, age and relationship.
- Understand possessive adjectives better in French ('my' form only).
